

NJHS Offers Helping Hands

Hand 2 Hand is a non-profit organization that collects food for kids in the Byron Center and the surrounding areas.

In total, they pack and donate food for over 190 schools. They feed over 5,200 kids.

Cheri Honderd founded this organization in 2008 while serving as the Director of Kids Hope USA, and learned that some students were going hungry, which she felt was an injustice (https://h2hkids.org). Cheri came up with a way to send food home with kids who were hungry.

A small backpack of food is sent home with kids in need on Fridays, providing breakfast, lunch, dinner and several snacks.

NJHS students at WMS have volunteered their time, helping pack food and writing notes for the kids. If other students want to help Hand 2 Hand there are sign ups at https://signup.com/go/OFUrngc.

8th grader Sydney Boucher has volunteered her time through NJHS.

Another gift idea that is not as familiar is a Christmas-tree-pinecone. If you have pine trees near, just grab a pinecone from outside.

You'll need some paint, too. Then, just paint the pinecone green, and let it dry.

If you're feeling fancy, add a little white onto the edges to mimic snow. This small Christmas pinecone will be an easy, small, and cute decoration.

If you don't have any pinecones on hand, don't worry! A hand-decorated mug is just as good of an idea, if not, much more useful. It's simple and fun to make.

All you need is some oilbased paint markers, a plain white mug, a working oven, and possibly some rubbing-alcohol if you're prone to making mistakes.

Make sure to have adult supervision when working with an oven and rubbing-alcohol. The mug and paint markers can easily be found in a dollar store.

Once you have all of the needed materials, you can draw whatever designs you would like to onto the mug with the paint markers.

If you make a mistake and want to get rid of it, rub a rubbing-alcohol dipped cotton swab onto the mistake. It'll rub it right off.

Once done drawing, place the mug into the oven at 350 degrees Fahrenheit for 30 minutes. This will make sure that the marker sticks well.

When giving your custom mug away, be sure to tell the gift receiver that the mug must be handwashed. Placing it into the dishwasher will cause the maker to wear off quickly.

Your family and friends will appreciate these simple, but heartfelt gifts you can make.


The book has also been read and approved by Lin Manuel-Miranda, writer of the musical *Hamilton*.
